I refer to your request received on 13 January and clarified on 16 January 2023, which has been considered under the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA), for the following information:

We request copies of all advice and information provided by Manatū Taonga (Ministry of Culture and Heritage) from 2017 to the current date to either Minister Curran, Minister Faafoi or Minister Jackson regarding the possibility, viability and/or potential to fund public media and/or local media content via a levy or levies on internet service providers, online advertising sales (eg by Google and Facebook), pay TV, video-on-demand and streaming services, digital device sales and/or other digital services.

Item 9 (extract from BR2022/108):

73 A broader approach to the discussion document could be pursued, where stakeholders are consulted on a range of options (for example, a levy on digital platforms and copyright reform). However, our previous advice to you and BR2022/108 Supporting the sustainability of news media in a digital environment 16 conversations with other agencies suggests that a digital bargaining framework is the option most likely to support the desired policy outcomes.

The purpose of the briefing (BR2022/108) was to seek approval to release a targeted discussion document to:

- gather wider views and evidence on the nature of the relationship between global digital platforms and New Zealand news media businesses; and
- explore how a digital bargaining framework could support the news media sector, or whether other options should be considered.


We searched our database and were unable to find any advice provided to Hon Curran regarding the viability of a levy.
